Kings and Elections

One year ago in my May newsletter article I wrote, "This year (2024) has been widely proclaimed to be the year of elections, with national elections expected in at least 64 countries. This means that half of the world's population will have the opportunity to change their government" That was written in early 2024. As we know now a year later, what actually happened nobody could have predicted. Not to be political, but our elections brought complete shock and awe around the world. The USA would take center stage when all was said and done, and the dust settled on 2024.

Based on recent history of the globalist elite, it was anticipated around the world that the political Marxist left would continue it's gains as election after election occurred. But that's not what happened in one significant election--ours.

(Relax, this is not going to be partisan. As a pastor, I realize that we all may not agree on traditional politics. We pastors are prodded from all directions to be more vocal on issues. I don't take a political stand, but I do take a stand on biblical issues.) So my statement is this, it's not inaccurate or an overstatement to acknowledge that leftists and even Marxists have taken over one side of the political spectrum in the west—that includes Europe and the North America.

What is behind all this? We call this movement worldwide Globalism. It is also known as the new world order, or the great reset. Going back about ten years ago, we can document a more aggressive turn in their agenda. Major components were a whole vocabulary of new terms and acronyms. Terms and abbreviations we did not make up, nor are familiar with. Probably the most common now is "woke". But there are many others that have been thrown around to intimidate as they communicate their new vocabulary.

The motivation and incentive behind this radical agenda is the threat of imminent crises such as pandemics, climate catastrophe. Another motivation is so called justice and human rights, immigration, the flow of people, an anti-nationalism spirit, (hence globalism), and equality.

Note these are all noble and legitimate challenges, though we may not agree on their threat level. With justice and human rights they can bandwagon with the liberal church, and they have.

But these things are all excuses that these warriors use to exercise control over what other people think and say. They use "virtues" such as justice and even love to justify dramatic overreaches of control. They use disease and pandemics, along with the fear which goes along with it to justify strict limitations over behavior—remember the lockdowns? The "D" in Diversity Equity and Inclusion standing primarily for unrestricted (illegal) immigration, and the removal of borders. And there are dozens serious public and private policy issues awaiting in line.

One last example is their willingness to sacrifice freedoms, like freedom of speech to preserve their narrative. Remember the "C" words, conspiracy or consensus. Both are argued over in a tug of war over information. In spite of all this, it is however no new revelation to serious Bible readers and people of faith, that God is in control—another "C" word. But prior to that another will attempt complete control—the anti-christ or beast of Revelation 13.

This is serious folks. We cannot take this lightly. Other examples that were derailed because of the November election results: the fateful year 2030 Climate change deadlines", the WHO Pandemic treaty signed by many world leaders, giving away our sovereignty in another "health emergency".

We need to observe what is happening in France, Germany and the UK. I don't think this is an overstatement, had things gone differently here in the US back in November, that we would have led the world into complete and total globalism.

We are seeing very graphically the power and influence of one world leader. Trump is already hailed as the anti-christ by some. No one denies his questionable past. But as long as he supports the Bible, Israel, and biblical truths that accusation doesn't stand. Bill Maher, comedian, and political commentator is calling for a Democratic Donald Trump. Many will heed that call.

There is always a pendulum swing, and if a Democratic, i.e. a leftist/Marxist "Trump" arises, and he will, watch out. The Bible predicts just that eventually. The question is when. Having studied and written about these things over the last 10 years, I suggest that what is taking place now is a pause between the birth pains. The enemy will come roaring back, and things will be much worse. That is certainly prophecied in the long term, but what if we are there right now? I believe we are in those days.

We need to do two things, we need to take advantage of the opportunity before us, for the spreading of the Gospel. Second, we need to look at our allies like those in the UK who are under the heel of globalists and take note. We are under a reprieve. So we need to prepare the ship during the sunny weather for the inevitable storms ahead.

Will America be great again? That depends upon the pulpits. It depends upon the churches. This is a spiritual battle. We live in a world where change can happen overnight, and the enemy is held in check by God. Psalm 45:6- "Your throne, O God, is forever and ever; a Scepter of righteousness is the scepter of Your kingdom." (see also Heb 1:8), and another, Psalm 47:8- "God reigns over the nations; God sits on His holy throne."

"And I saw thrones, and they sat on them, and judgment was committed to them;" (Rev 20:4) Rev 22:1,3 "And he showed me a pure river of water of life, clear as crystal, proceeding from the throne of God and of the Lamb...And there shall be no more curse, but the throne of God and of the Lamb shall be in it, and His servants shall serve Him."

This was my closing paragraph one year ago and it is still true...

"And no matter what leaders are elected this year, or any other, this is still the ultimate truth."

"Therefore God also has highly exalted Him and given Him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those in heaven, and of those on earth, and of those under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." (Phil 2:9-11)



On the Beaches of Normandy


During World War II, the Allies carried out amphibious assault landings on June 6, 1944. In the ensuing battle, thousands of young men and women lost their lives. Not far from the landing site, there is now a very large well-groomed cemetery with a beautiful chapel at one end. In the chapel one finds an altar of black and gold Pyrenees marble engraved with the inscription: *I Give Unto Them Eternal Life And They Shall Never Perish.*

In graves in front of the chapel, lie the bodies of 9,387 service men and women. Each headstone identifies the person buried there, with the exception of 307 whose bodies were unidentified. Nearby there is a stone tablet telling of 1,557 men and women who died in battle but whose bodies were never found.

Walking through the cemetery is a heart-rending experience. Tears come easily. Here are generals buried beside privates, blacks beside whites, Jews beside Christians, Americans from 49 states plus the District of Columbia and Guam. Each paid the ultimate sacrifice.

All died for freedom. All died on our behalf.

As we prepare for Memorial Day, we might well ask ourselves: "Am I worth their sacrifice? Am I grateful to them? What might I be willing to give to bring peace and freedom to the world?"



May is Melanoma Awareness Month

Melanoma is a specific kind of skin cancer. It begins in skin cells called melanocytes. Melanocytes produce melanin, the substance that gives your skin color.

Only about 1% of skin cancers are melanomas. Melanoma is also called malignant melanoma or cutaneous melanoma.

When melanoma is diagnosed in the early stages, most people respond well to treatment. But when not caught early, it spreads easily to other parts of the body.

What are the symptoms?

Early signs and symptoms of melanoma are:

- changes to an existing mole
- the development of a new, unusual growth on your skin

If melanoma cells are still making melanin, the tumors tend to be brown or black. Some melanomas don't make melanin, so those tumors can be tan, pink, or white. Sometimes, the skin will appear normal even though melanoma has begun to develop.

Clues that a mole might be melanoma are:

- irregular shape
- irregular border
- multicolored or uneven coloring
- larger than a quarter of an inch
- changes in size, shape, or color
- itchiness or bleeding

Melanoma can start anywhere on your skin. The most likely areas, though, are:

- chest and back for men
- legs for women
- neck
- face

This may be because these areas have more exposure to the sun than other parts of the body. Melanoma can form in areas that don't receive much sun, such as the soles of your feet, palms of your hands, and fingernail beds.

Understanding Tick Bites and Lyme Disease

How to prevent tick bites



Ticks can spread disease, including Lyme disease.


Protect yourself:

- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)registered insect repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, or 2-undecanone.
 Always follow product instructions.
- · Wear clothing treated with permethrin.
- Shower as soon as possible after spending time outdoors.
- Check for ticks daily. Ticks can hide under the armpits, behind the knees, in the hair, and in the groin.
- Tumble clothes in a dryer on high heat for 10 minutes to kill ticks on dry clothing after you come indoors. If the clothes are damp, additional time may be needed.

How to remove a tick

- 1. Use fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible.
- 2. Pull upward with steady, even pressure to remove the tick. Avoid twisting or jerking.
- 3. Clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.


- Remove the tick as soon as possible to reduce your chances of getting an infection from the tick bite.
- Don't use nail polish, petroleum jelly, or a hot match to make the tick detach.
- If tick mouthparts remain in the skin, leave them alone. In most cases, they will fall out in a few days.

When to see your healthcare provider

If you develop a rash, fever, exhaustion, or joint and muscle aches within several weeks of removing a tick or spending time in tick habitat, see your healthcare provider. Be sure to mention your recent tick bite and when it happened, or that you've spent time in places where ticks may live.

If left untreated, Lyme disease can affect the joints, heart, or nervous system.

Antibiotics treat Lyme disease

People treated with antibiotics in the early stages of Lyme disease usually recover rapidly and completely. The antibiotics most commonly used to treat Lyme disease include: doxycycline, amoxicillin, or cefuroxime axetil.

Looking ahead to recovery

Rest and take antibiotics as prescribed. Recovery may take several weeks or longer.

Some people wonder if there is a test to confirm that they are cured, but there is no such test. Retesting for Lyme disease is not recommended because blood tests might be positive for months or years after you have been treated. A positive test doesn't mean you are still infected. It simply means that your immune system remembers your infection.

You can get Lyme disease again if you are bitten by another infected tick, so protect yourself from tick bites.

Awareness Month

The month of May is designated as Hepatitis Awareness Month in the United States, and May 19th is Hepatitis Testing Day. During May, CDC and our public health partners work to shed light on the impact of these hidden epidemics by raising awareness of viral hepatitis while encouraging testing and vaccination. Hepatitis Awareness Month activities help to improve everyone's understanding of viral hepatitis transmission and risk factors and to decrease social stigma against viral hepatitis

Viral Hepatitis Key Facts

- There are several different viruses that can cause hepatitis; the most common types of viral hepatitis are hepatitis A, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C.
- Chronic hepatitis B and hepatitis C are leading causes of liver cancer in the United States.
- Both hepatitis A and hepatitis B are preventable with safe and effective vaccines, and hepatitis C is curable with prescribed treatment.
- CDC recommends all adults through age 59 and adults age 60 or older with risk factors get vaccinated against hepatitis and hepatitis B. If you are age 60 or older and do not have risk factors, you may choose to get vaccinated.
- About 66% of people with hepatitis B are unaware of their infection and about 40% of people living with hepatitis C do no know they are infected.
- CDC recommends all adults get tested for hepatitis B and hepatitis C at least once in their lifetime and pregnant women get tested during each pregnancy. Getting tested is the only way to know if you have hepatitis B or hepatitis C.
